

# Diabetes walk to set record

Piedmont residents, university students, and anybody else who wants to spend the morning outside Saturday will have a chance to lace up their athletic shoes and hit the walking trail, while at the same time raising money for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation.

Participants in the 4.9-mile Walk for the Cure, after checking in at 8 a.m. at the Wake Forest track, will begin their excursion at about 9:30 a.m.

Walkers will follow a trail that extends from campus through the Reynolda Gardens and Graylyn Conference Center areas and back to Wake Forest, according to Gene Blackwelder of the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation, the Walk-a-thon chair.

Walkers should bring registration forms and any donations that they have received from their sponsors when they register for the event.

All participants who have raised at least \$50 in donations will receive a t-

shirt; walkers who have collected at least \$75 will be presented with a single meal coupon good at Wendy's; and anyone who has raised at least \$250 is eligible to enter a drawing for two tickets from USAir for any domestic USAir flight.

According to Blackwelder, over 100 Juvenile Diabetes Foundation walk-a-thons are taking place this fall all over the country, but "this is our first year in the Piedmont-Triad."

He said that the national record for the greatest number of participants in a first-year diabetes walk is 110,000 people. "Winston-Salem and Greensboro together are going to break the national record.

We have 86,000 people registered already and pledges for gobs more," said Blackwelder.

"We're really excited about the fact that we're going to set a national record for a first-year walk," he said.

When asked how the fundraiser has attracted the interest of so many people, Blackwelder said, "Our primary focus has been on company recruitment.

We asked two high-profile company executives to recruit their peers in business and come up with company teams."

Blackwelder said that, as a result of several presentations to Wake Forest sororities and faculty recruitment, over 100 students and faculty members have registered for the walk-a-thon.

All proceeds from the event will come from donations and will benefit juvenile diabetes research.

Free refreshments, including sandwiches, ice cream and Pepsi, will be provided, along with music from the radio station Oldies 93.

In addition to media sponsors High Point Enterprise, Summit Cable Services, Oldies 93, Cablevision and the Triad Business News, a large number of businesses are serving as sponsors for the fundraiser.

According to Blackwelder, "The Fresh Market, the presenting sponsor, gave \$25,000. They're supplying a big chunk of the money."

The walk-a-thon will take place on Saturday, rain or shine.

they won't have a choice. I think there needs to be a student on (COT) because this affects so many students and will affect every freshman next year."

About 100 students in this year's pilot program use the IBM Thinkpad 360 color, which Buck Bailiff, the assistant vice president for project management, described as a "hybrid" computer.

A base model Thinkpad with memory upgraded from 4 MB RAM to 12 MB was combined with an internal modem, a faster processor, an active matrix screen, and a top-of-the-line Ethernet adapter.

This hybrid is available at the College Bookstore at a cost of \$3,136.95, which corresponds to the estimated price available in the IBM PC Direct catalog at that time.

However, the 360 Color model was discontinued three months ago, according to Duncan, a salesperson at the IBM PC Direct hotline, and replaced with the 755 Color. But the 360 Color is the only model available in the College Bookstore.

Elmer Hayashi, a professor of mathematics, teaches Thinkpad Math 111 this semester, a class comprised mainly of pilot students which is designed to integrate computers and course work.

Despite viruses in students' machines, lost data and other glitches that occurred in the first few weeks of class, Hayashi was positive about the new technology in the classroom.

Students in Thinkpad Math 111 must have their own laptop to participate in class, but Hayashi said hardware is not the key issue about which to be concerned.

"I have no problems with students who do not own a Thinkpad but another brand laptop computer," he said.

"More important is that students have the same software installed so I am able to require certain tasks and be sure that everybody is able to fulfill the requirements."

academic reputation, student selectivity, faculty resources, financial resources, retention rank and alumni satisfaction. Last year was the first year Wake Forest was ranked in the national university category. According to Martha Allman, the associate director of admissions, this year's freshman class was chosen from the largest applicant pool

in history since 6,700 students applied to the university last year.

According to Paul Escott, the dean of the college, high college guide rankings, though welcome, are not the goal of the university. "We want to make Wake Forest a better Wake Forest," he said. "Though we are happy with the rankings, we will not be guided by them."

Other universities in the state also ranked well in the survey. Duke University placed sixth in the national category, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill placed 27th in the same category.

Davidson College placed 21st in the national liberal arts colleges group.
