

# Men's tennis warms up at annual scrimmage

The Demon Deacon men's tennis fall season play has commenced once again as the team held its annual intrasquad Black and Gold scrimmage Saturday.

The Black and Gold scrimmage serves to open the fall tennis season in which the Deacons participate in a wide variety of tournaments in preparation for the spring regular season.

Specifically, the scrimmage serves to provide players with some match play and gives the squad a chance to observe teammates in game-type situations.

"It is a contrived practice," Head Coach Ian Crookenden said.

This year's event displayed the skills of many promising players. Strong play

throughout the squad earned kudos from Crookenden.

"We have some very good depth," he said. Barring injury, the combination of depth and veteran leadership should make the Demon Deacon squad a veritable force in the forthcoming fall events and once again in the spring.

Currently, the squad is preparing for future match events.

"We are getting ready for some individual tournaments," Crookenden said. Included in the list of fall events are tournaments at North Carolina Sept. 28 and once again Oct. 13, the Southern Intercollegiate running Oct. 5-9 and a tournament at Georgia Tech also Oct. 13.

Several players from the squad will represent the Demon Deacons at each event.

# Men's golf places 12th in first tournament

The Demon Deacon men's golf team finished a disappointing 12th out of 20 in its first tournament of the fall, the Ping/Golfweek Intercollegiate at the Pumpkin Ridge Golf Club in Portland, Ore., this weekend.

Arizona State finished first with a total score of 867 followed by UNLV in second with a score of 874.

The Demon Deacons scored a total of 899, just below 10th-place finisher East Tennessee State with 897, and Kent State in the 11th position with 898.

Darren Angel of Arizona State won the tournament with 209, and Charles Warren of Clemson trailed closely behind in second with 212.

Junior Justin Roof finished first among the Deacons, scoring 220 and finishing 14th in the tournament. Senior Robert Dean scored inconsistently through out the competition, ending up in 25th place with an overall score of 223.

Freshman Juan Vizcaya scored 227, finish-

ing in 43rd place, and sophomore Thomas Parker placed 58th with 231. Junior Ray Floyd Jr. finished last among the Deacons scoring 235 and placing 78th.

The tournament was a shaky start to the new fall season for which Head Coach Jack Lewis had high hopes after a disappointing season last spring.

Problems like course management and mental strength that plagued the team last year continue to be issues that hamper the Demon Deacons' ability this season.

"Mental discipline and patience are weaknesses for some and we're going to have to improve this, but also it boils down to course management," Lewis said.

"Some of our players have it and some of them don't, so it's a matter of trying to get everyone to improve.

"As long as you have a golfing career, you have to always continue to improve the short

game and the course management aspect of it and those are things that take years and years of work," the coach continued.

The Ping/Golfweek Intercollegiate might be considered one of the beginning stepping stones on the road back to success for the Deacons. This season is a fresh start for the team, as the squad enters the fall season with six new freshmen and the active participation of sophomore Thomas Parker, who was redshirted last season.

With this new mix of players comes a whole new mix of strengths. One of those strengths, according to Lewis, is chemistry.

"I feel like we've got chemistry among the players who have the desire to be good, succeed, and make sure that this golf program is one of the top in the country," Lewis said.

The Demon Deacons' next action comes in two weeks, when they travel to the Show-me state to participate in the Missouri Bluffs Intercollegiate tournament in St. Charles.

The event will mark the beginning of a comparatively hectic three week stretch for the players, as they travel to Dallas, Texas Oct. 9 and Durham a week later.

# Women's soccer ties UGA, falls to Terps

The women's soccer team faced two of its toughest challenges this weekend when it tied the Georgia Bulldogs 2-2 and then lost to No. 15 Maryland 3-0.

The Deacons matched Georgia goal for goal in a thrilling matchup on Polo Field Friday afternoon. Freshmen forwards Lisa Olynyk and Julie Scott led their team with one goal each in a very physical contest between two teams who simply refused to throw in the towel, even after two successive overtimes.

Sunday, the Deacons packed their bags for College Park, Md. to meet the unbeaten Terrapins. Sophomore Deacon netminder Jacki Ball managed to get her hands on everything Maryland fired at her during the first half, but the Terps came back with a vengeance after the break and rallied to a 3-0 victory.

Friday's game against a somewhat rowdy Georgia squad proved to be one of the most exciting games of the season as the Deacons tried to extend their winning

streak to four in a row. Olynyk got things rolling during the first 1:29 as she chipped in the quickest goal in the varsity team's short one year history. Just 10 minutes later, sophomore Kate Crowley sparked another goal by making a phenomenal cross to Scott after being leveled by a Georgia defender.

However, Georgia started to pull its team together midway through the first half when Jennifer Ahearn drilled one into the upper right-hand corner. After the intermission, the Bulldogs came on strong and Ali Comis beat out goal-

keeper Ball to score into an empty net.

Despite a number of opportunities, neither team was able to capitalize during the remainder of regulation, and the contest was forced into overtime. The Deacons had several chances during extended play to finish off the Bulldogs, but their shots just could not seem to find the net.

The Deacons could not seem to convert against Maryland either in Sunday's game at Ludwig Field. After holding their ground during the first half, the Deacons just could not stand up to the Terps' offensive power.

Maryland forwards Michelle Deville and Emmy Harbo managed to slip two goals past Ball during the first 15 minutes after the break, and senior Michelle Demko added a goal at the 70:50 mark to make the final score 3-0.

The spotlight continues to illuminate the sensational play of the Deacon freshmen, six of whom have started in every game this season. Olynyk continues to lead the young squad in scoring with five on the season, while sophomore Cheryl Zimmerman is tied with Scott in assists with two each.
