

Floyd's 216 paces men's golf squad to 10th-place tie in Texas tourney

The Demon Deacon men's golf team played in the 1995 Taylor Made Red River Classic at the Dallas Athletic Club Monday and Tuesday. The team finished 10th out of 17 teams, tying with the University of New Mexico with a final overall score of 873.

The University of Texas won the tournament with a large lead, scoring 846. Oklahoma State University and Arizona State University took the second and third place positions with 854 and 865, respectively.

Brad Elder from the University of Texas clinched first place with strokes to spare, scoring 204. Taking second place was Robert McMillian of the University of New Mexico and Dru Fenimore from Texas A&M, each with a score of 211.

Among the Deacons, senior Ray Floyd Jr. finished first

with a final score of 216 and 17th overall. This was a recovery for Floyd after a shaky start at the beginning of the fall season. Close behind was the usual team leader, junior Justin Roof, who had a score of 217 and took 22nd place. Sophomore Todd Lynch placed 38th with a score of 220. Trailing uncommonly far behind was senior Robert Dean in 52nd place scoring 222. Sophomore Bill Bishop finished last among the Deacons in 70th place with a score of 227.

For the past few seasons the Deacons have been battling problems with course management, putting and mental toughness. After the team's second place finish in the Missouri Bluffs Intercollegiate two weeks ago it appeared that the team might be coming out of its slump. However, its disappointing finish in this tournament seems to render those hopes premature.

The Deacons will play next in the Black and Decker Duke Golf Classic in Durham Sunday and Monday.

The Demon Deacon squad also made a strong showing in the doubles portion of the event. Specifically, the combination of senior James Hosie and Stump provided the Demon Deacons a White flight title.

First round opposition from Notre Dame provided little hope against the Demon Deacon pair, as the Irish fell 8-2. Despite the relatively easy first round, the two Deacon seniors managed to remain focused against a challenging Michigan duo. The end result was an 8-6 victory for the tandem. In the finals, facing Pietrowski and Rothchild from Notre Dame, the Deacon combo proved to

be the stronger, winning 8-5.

Also playing doubles for the Demon Deacons were senior Suraj Betheja and Chou, who competed in the Black flight of competition. Although the pair won with little problem against Michigan, 8-4, in its first match, it could not get by McNab and Hill of North Carolina in the second round of play.

Another notable combination playing doubles was junior Josh Osswald who was coupled with Blue flight singles champion Merkert. The duo was paired with a nationally ranked team of Pusztai and Costanzo from Michigan. Although the Deacon pair lost 8-6, Crookenden was pleased with this and other doubles performances. "It is a good indicator that we can field strong doubles teams," he said.

Overall Crookenden was very pleased with his team's strong showing. "Anytime you can win a

title, it is a good omen for the spring," Crookenden said.

The results from the 1995 Georgia Tech Fall Classic were less decisive than those of the Carolina Classic, which seemed to be a harbinger of a promising spring season. Due to inclement weather, the tournament was forced indoors. The indoor facilities could not house all of the scheduled matches and therefore caused many cancellations.

Among the Demon Deacons that were able to play, the only notable performance came from the sophomore tandem of Charlie King and Scott Sink in Flight B doubles. Against Porsella and Yukawa of UNC-Greensboro, the pair ground out an 8-5 victory before its second-round elimination.

The team resumes its fall season today at the ITA All American tournament in Austin, Texas which runs through Sunday.

Men's cross country runs to fourth place finish at UNC event

Hopefully, veteran senior Paul Kinser can feel vindicated by the way he has concluded his Demon Deacon cross country career.

Kinser was the second collegiate finisher in the men's university division of the North Carolina State Collegiate Championships at UNC-Charlotte. He finished with a time of 25:22, leading the Deacon B team to a fourth-place finish.

"This was an excellent opportunity for senior Paul Kinser, who started out so well for us, had a slight injury and then got sick," Head Coach John Goodridge said. "He had a very, very strong performance in placing third. We're real pleased with Kinser's performance as we are with (sophomore) Matt Shady's. Shady has been in our top seven in all of our meets."

Shady finished ninth with a time of 25:54.

Rounding out the Deacons' top five were sophomore Hunter Kemper (25th overall), freshman Parker Fleming (32nd) and sophomore Scott MacDonald (43rd). Fleming's time of 26:47 was a personal best for him.

Many of the top runners who have contributed for the Deacons throughout the season did not run at UNC-Charlotte.

"Most of our athletes had come off of two high level competitions in the past two weeks," Goodridge said. "And by design we've gone back into a training cycle for the ACC Championships. This competition here was the last competition for a lot of athletes before the championship season."

The ACC Championship meet will be held on campus Oct. 28.

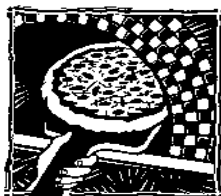

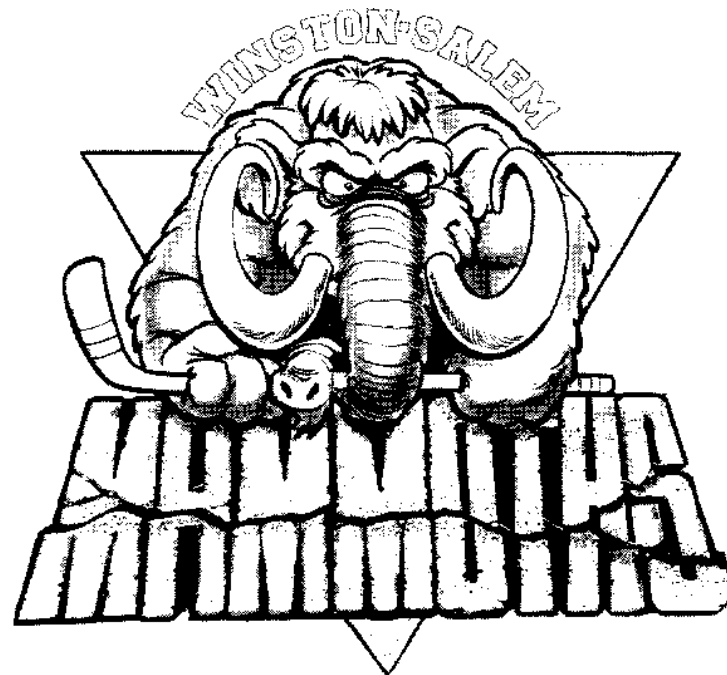
