■ Clinton calls for unity

WASHINGTON — President Bill Clinton basked in the glory of a big re-election victory and returned to the White House. Clinton issued a plea for unity after piling up 379 electoral votes to 159 for Republican challenger Bob Dole. The win made Clinton the first Democrat to be returned to the White House in successive terms since Franklin Roosevelt more than 50 years ago. Republicans retained majorities in both houses of Congress.

■ Cabinet changes taking shape

WASHINGTON — Now that President Bill Clinton has been re-elected, his cabinet is about to undergo a major overhaul. Secretary of State Warren Christopher reportedly has already resigned and an official confirmed that Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary also is leaving. Pentagon officials say Defense Secretary William Perry also is ready to quit within a few months. Christopher plans to stay in office until Clinton begins his second term Jan. 20. United Nations Ambassador Madeleine Albright and former Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell are considered to be among the leading candidates to succeed Christopher. Clinton has already put in place a system to fill the spots that are expected to open up as people leave.

■ Abortion pill may be delayed

NEW YORK — Two non-profit organizations attempting to bring the French abortion pill mifepristone to the United States filed a lawsuit against Joseph Pike. Pike was in charge of organizing the production and distribution of the pill. In New York Supreme Court, the Population Council and Advances in Health Technology allege that Pike has committed fraud. This argument could cause delay in the release of mifepristone in the United States.

■ U.S. tries to avoid sending troops

WASHINGTON — In attempt to avoid using armed forces to assist 1.4 million refugees in Zaire, American diplomats are trying to get Zaire and Rwanda to agree to a cease-fire. This agreement should allow relief forces to reenter the area in Central Africa and should shut down eastern Zaire refugee camps.

If a cease-fire is reached, U.S. troops will not be necessary to establish zones where water and food could be given out. Although the Zairian rebels established a three-week cease-fire, the Zaire government has not officially recognized the agreement.

Safety awareness week to feature campus safety checks, prizes, fair

College campuses can seem like the safest places in the world, but without proper precautions they can become some of the most dangerous areas around. Safety Awareness week, Monday through Nov. 16, is intended to make students aware of the possible dangers of college life.

Through a collaborative effort between Campus Police, Residence Life and Housing, and the health and exercise science department, Safety Awareness Week will be six days of common sense preventative information.

Donna Horosko, the Campus Police prevention specialist, said, "We're attempting to make Safety Awareness Week a passive campaign."

Random campus safety checks will be made most every evening by Horosko in populated areas. Walkways, parking lots and other areas will be targeted.

"When I see people doing things in a safe manner, for example, a group out running together, I'll give away free prizes," Horosko said.

A safety trivia quiz will also be distributed among the students with questions pertaining to safety awareness.

Prizes such as a dinner for two off campus and free smoothies donated by ARAMARK will be given out. Anyone who answers all the questions correctly will receive a gift.

Another way that safety awareness will be promoted is

through the use of different safety messages posted all over campus.

"We're going to post different safety messages such as 'don't drink and drive' and 'take responsibility for your safety' in the residence halls, around campus, and at the entrances and exits," Horosko said. These messages will be changed daily and it is hoped that they will encourage students to think about safety.

A safety awareness fair will be held Nov. 15 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Benson University Center, across from Pizza Hut. The fair will include a breathalyzer demonstration, safety information and free giveaways.

In conjunction with RLH, residence hall safety checks will be made. "We will go around and the dorm with the least safety infractions, i.e. locked hall room doors, will win a free pizza party donated by Pizza Hut," Horosko said.

"The plan is to culminate all this at the football game against Duke with 'Tie One on for Safety,'" Horosko said. Many student organizations like the Resident Student Association, Panhellenic Council, Bacchus, Interfraternity Council, Safe Rides, and Student Shuttle Services are helping to arrange this campaign where ribbons will be distributed to be placed on cars or to be worn prior to the game. Maria Malambri, the residence life coordinator, said, "The premise of this campaign is to dissuade our university community from alcohol consumption and driving. These ribbons are symbolic pledges that the university community agrees to abstain from drinking and driving."
