## Get more out of macaroni

Yes, you can do better than ordinary mac-and-cheese

College students do unspeakable things to macaroni. Really awful things, like smothering them in Velveeta and nuking it.

Quite frankly, this behavior is despicable. What's more, according to the Hale-Whitworth treaty of 1931, there was to be no further cooking of macaroni in combination with processed cheese products in exclusion. Italy pushed hard for the inclusion of this clause, and the United States signed it. So shame on all you slackers who can't find anything better to do with your macaroni.

There are other things to do with macaroni, such as spray-painting it a metallic color and putting them on a string; however, cooking it is usually a good idea, as that metallic paint tastes terrible.

Macaroni Random is a fairly easy dish. In fact, all you really need is a

large skillet. Food is nice, too, but the large skillet is the important thing. You will also need a knife, spatula or spoon, a bowl and a can for grease.

## Ingredients:

- 3/4 cup macaroni (1 cup if large macaroni is used)
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 small white onion, minced
- 1 large tomato, chopped
- 1 16-ounce can of kidney beans, drained
- 1 16-ounce can of tomato sauce
- 2 tablespoons chili powder or 8 chili peppers, chopped
- shredded cheese of some description

*Don't* cook the macaroni. Although those tasty little pasta chunks practically beg to be thrown in a pot of boiling water, that's not how it's done.

Start off by setting a large burner on medium high. Chop the onion, tomato and chili peppers if necessary. Brown the ground beef in the skillet with the onion.

Once the beef is no longer pink, drain the grease into the can. Throw in everything else but the cheese. Yes, throw the *uncooked* macaroni

in, too.

Decrease the heat on the burner to medium. This will prevent the splattering of tomato sauce that makes most residence hall kitchens look like the Chinese police used them for interrogation rooms.

This recipe will fairly well fill a 10-inch skillet. So when you stir, and you should stir often, be careful. Food running down the sides of a skillet onto a burner eye is a bad thing. Though it may not cause a fire alarm to sound immediately, the next person who uses that eye may set off the alarm.

When you are standing in your Spider-Man pajamas out in the freezing cold at 3 a.m. because of a fire alarm, ask yourself, "Did I stir carefully so as not to spill any food on the burner?" If the answer is no, you have no one to blame but yourself.

Once the food has simmered for 20 to 25 minutes, make sure the macaroni is tender, and remove it from the burner. Turn the burner off, too. Put in a microwavable bowl or plate and top with the cheese. Either let it stand for a few minutes, or hurry the process along with 30 to 45 seconds in the microwave.
