## ■ Mid-air collision shakes India

CHARKHIDADRI, India — The world's deadliest mid-air collision occurred Tuesday over India. 373 people were killed when a Saudi Arabian jumbo jetliner collided with a Kazakh Ilyushin freighter plane. The jetliner had just left New Delhi en route to Saudi Arabia when the planes collided at a height of about 15,000 feet. Efforts have not yet been made to recover the black box flight recorder.

## ■ U.S. troops heading to Zaire

WASHINGTON — The White House says President Bill Clinton has agreed "in principle" to send U.S. troops to help with the Zairean refugee crisis. The U.S. commitment will involve several thousand troops for a four-month period.

The United States had been reluctant to get involved in Zaire, where more than one million refugees are in need of food and supplies, but had been under pressure from Canada and France. Before agreeing to take part, the United States had insisted that the duration of the mission be limited and that it include an international force. The refugees have been fleeing fighting between Zaire's army and rebels from the Tutsi tribe.

## ■ Christopher discusses Bosnia

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Warren Christopher met with the three members of Bosnia's joint presidency in Paris Wednesday, hoping to persuade them to work together to rebuild their country. It is the first time the three co-presidents have appeared together on the international stage, but their travel arrangements show how deep their rivalry runs. Serb Momcilo Krajisnik refused to fly on the same plane as Muslim Alija Izetbegovic and Croat Kresimir Zubak. The meeting took place a day before an international conference in Paris, held to adopt a two-year plan to consolidate peace in Bosnia.

## ■ Alien fraud ruling decided

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court unanimously ruled Wednesday that the Immigration and Naturalization Service can consider an alien's acts of fraud in entering the United States when deciding whether to proceed with deportation.

The case involved a Chinese-born man whose wife divorced him in Taiwan and then acquired fake documents proclaiming her an American citizen. She then remarried the man so they could move to the United States.

The court's ruling said the INS had discretion in its decisions and can distinguish between cases involving immigration fraud with those involving a single act of misrepresentation.

# Air-conditioning installation, construction are abundant

The bulldozers, mud pits and sounds of construction workers have become common on campus, and with the number of projects planned to begin in the near future, students and faculty should not expect an end to the disturbances.

Most of the current construction on campus is part of a project to improve the air conditioning in most of the buildings on campus, according to Bill Sides, the director of facilities management.

The project involves the installation of a loop of supply and return piping connected to two plants which create cold water to run the air conditioning units. A third water chilling plant will be completed next spring.

The construction taking place near Luter and Babcock residence halls is to connect those dorms to the piping loop. Work is also being done near the Z. Smith Reynolds Library to connect it to the loop as well.

All of the residence halls on the Quad, Johnson and Bostwick residence halls, and Reynolda Hall are already connected to the pipe loop. Collins Residence Hall will be connected by winter break, and all of the student apartments, Wait Chapel, and Wingate Hall will be connected next summer.

"The system will significantly upgrade our capacity to air condition all the buildings," Sides said.

The system will also save money on energy use due to increased efficiency, and will allow the air conditioners to keep functioning even if one chilling plant fails, Sides said.

Other construction projects underway include Shorty's, the coffee shop/pub which is scheduled to open next spring in the Benson University Center, and the Bridger Field

House in Groves Stadium, which will house the football locker rooms, banquet and meeting facilities, the sports marketing offices, and the university's Hall of Fame. The field house will be completed next summer, Sides said.

Many projects are planned to begin soon as well. An indoor tennis center will be built adjacent to Groves Stadium, which will house eight courts. Bids will be made for the project by the end of November, and the center should be completed by the middle of next summer.

At the site of the current tennis center, which will be torn down, the department of facilities management has planned an Information Services building, which will house the Information Services department, along with the ROTC offices, a food service area and a bookstore area. Construction on this building will begin next April and it should be open by May, 1998.

Once this new building is open, Student Health Services will relocate to the space currently occupied by the ROTC offices, doubling the space available to Student Health Services, Sides said.

The location vacated by Student Health Services will then house offices for campus ministry and a computer lounge for students.

Plans are also being made for the addition of a new classroom building, which is for now being called the Connector Building. The building will be located between Calloway and Carswell halls, and will house the Provost's offices, the psychology departments and the Romance languages department. People from each of these departments are now performing a programming study. "They're trying to determine how they want the building to function for their departments so the architect can design it accordingly," Sides said. Construction on the Connector Building should begin in early 1998 and it will be open by fall 1999.
