## ■ Gingrich renominated

WASHINGTON — Newt Gingrich won unanimous renomination as speaker of the House of Representatives Wednesday from his Republican colleagues. The Georgia conservative said it was a bittersweet day for him because his stepfather had died of cancer earlier in the day.

The full House will vote on another term as speaker for Gingrich on Jan. 7, and since the Republicans hold a 20-seat majority, it is unlikely that he will lose unless ethical matters blow up on him. The House Ethics Committee is to report on its investigation of Gingrich before the year is out. The committee is investigating whether a tax-exempt foundation Gingrich formerly headed was used illegally for political purposes.

## ■ More refugees on the move

GOMA, Zaire — Thousands of Rwandan refugees in Zaire were on the move again Wednesday, further weakening the case for an international intervention force. A U.N. organization said as many as 100,000 people could be involved in today's movement, which comes after 500,000 refugees returned to Rwanda during the weekend.

A second mass movement would almost certainly lead world powers to call off plans to send a Canadian-led humanitarian mission to the region. President Bill Clinton said Wednesday that the United States had made no final decision on involvement of U.S. forces in relief efforts.

## ■ Daschle seeks campaign reform

WASHINGTON — Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle asked Republicans Wednesday to work with Democrats in the first 60 days of the new Congress to reform the controversial and costly financing of political campaigns.

The two political parties raised unprecedented amounts of cash for this year's election, especially "soft money" — an unlimited channel for businesses, unions and wealthy people to funnel money into politics without regard to federal limits.

## ■ Clinton sends message to China

CANBERRA, Australia — President Bill Clinton addressed a joint session of the Australian parliament Wednesday. In his speech, Clinton reaffirmed Washington's commitment to the Asia-Pacific region but Clinton's message seemed to be directed to China. He reassured officials in Beijing that the United States has no interest in trying to contain China.

Earlier at a news conference in Canberra, Clinton deflected questions about questionable Democratic fundraising tactics.

# Network security questioned after modem access failure

"Login" and "password" were two words that anyone dialing into the university's network did not see early last week. Due to a software problem, some people who dialed the modem pool were "dropped" into another person's account without having to log in.

"We were doing some upgrades and modifications ... some of the information was undocumented and that was what caused some problems," said Ron Rimmer Jr., the Network Manager of Information Systems. The problem was not too serious as no damage was done, but the system was unusable for several days. Both the company that made the modems and the company that made the terminal software were on campus to fix the problem soon after it was detected.

In general, security is tight for the university's computer network. "I feel fairly confident of the security of the

systems," Rimmer said. "Students' grades and records are kept physically separate from the campus network."

Information Systems also uses other means to keep the network running and secure. Among its resources are sniffer programs, which can view what information is being transferred, and programs that monitor system use.

When the network slows down, IS can isolate the problem by looking at all usage on the network and then viewing what the problem is caused by.

The university has the ability to monitor all Internet traffic to and from students' computers, including personal e-mail or even the World Wide Web sites a user is visiting. Rimmer said, however, that the university does not take this tool lightly. "This is a powerful and regulated resource," Rimmer said.

Rimmer said he was more concerned with keeping the network running stably. "When we think there may be problems we find ways to solve them, but we are not in the business of being the Internet police," he said.

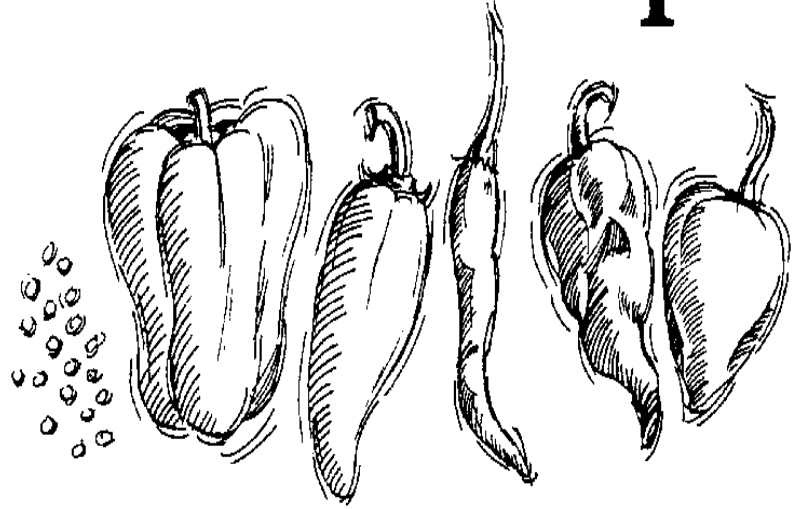
**MISCELLANEOUS** — A university employee received a harassing phone call between 6:50 p.m. and 7:51 p.m. Nov. 11.
