

# Deacons attempt history-making third win in a row against App. St.

The Deacons return home to face the visiting Mountaineers from Appalachian State Oct. 3 under the lights of Groves Stadium looking for their third win in a row, a feat the Deacons have not been able to pull off in the Caldwell regime.

The Mountaineers come to town having won their first three games of the season, with victories over Liberty, East Tennessee State and The Citadel.

The game, the Deacs' Homecoming, will be the 20th meeting between the two schools, with the Deacons holding the series lead 13-5-1.

However, in the past few meetings the games have been nailbiters, much to the chagrin of the Deacon

faithful, with 13 of the 19 games being decided by a touchdown or less.

In their previous meeting in 1996 the Deacons pulled out a 19-13 win, but in 1995 the Mountaineers shocked the Deacs with a 24-22 upset.

"Our games with Appalachian State have been remarkably close in the past and we anticipate another game much like that this Saturday.

"Obviously they come into the game undefeated and are playing well and with a great deal of confidence," Caldwell said

In 1993 Caldwell recorded his first career victory as the Deacon head man with a 20 to 3 victory over the Mountaineers and boasts a career mark of 3-1 against them in his six years at the helm of the Demon Deacon program.

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grand slam. Clouston and Munoz finished second overall in the tournament falling in the final round to Gregor Skorin and Nenad Zivkovic of UNLV 1-6, 4-6.

"It was very exciting," Munoz said. "We had been working very hard for the last year."

"It was kind of a surprise, but not quite because we had been working hard and playing together for a year."

Clouston echoed Munoz's excitement about the tournament. "It was a really good feeling," Clouston said of finishing sec-

ond. "We played really well the whole week. Even though we didn't win, we ended strongly and hopefully we can build on that for the rest of the season."

Their coach was equally proud of their success. "It shows that they are probably one of the best doubles team in the nation," Zinn said.

So what is it that makes them so good? Is it the mixture of speed and control? Possibly.

"He has fast hands and quick volleys," Clouston said when asked about Munoz. "I set it up. He finishes it."

What about mixing composure with explosiveness? They seem to possess this as well.

When asked to describe Munoz's style of play, Clouston had to take a few moments

to think. He finally decided on one word: explosive.

In turn, Munoz described Clouston as calm and composed on the court.

Then there's the basic combination of a good baseline player with a strong net player? Clouston and Munoz score a point here also.

"I set it up and play the baseline. He's the net player," Clouston said.

Finally we have the combination of aggressiveness with consistency. Clouston and Munoz rank here, too.

"He's a very good returner and very consistent. I have more of a quickness at the net and am more aggressive," Munoz said.

So perhaps the answer to the age old debate of what makes a great doubles team is simply a combination of everything.

However, maybe there's something else. Something that has not been debated before.

"They really enjoy playing with each other. They're friends on and off the court," Zinn said.

"We share a lot of interests and get along well. That has helped us experience success so far," Clouston said, echoing his coach's observations of the team.

Munoz offered yet another explanation of their success: competitiveness.

When asked what the No. 17 ranking means to the team, Munoz did not talk about the excitement or pride that it brings.

Instead he focused on what it means to a true athlete: competition.

"It means we have more work to do. We have to work harder to reach the top spot," Munoz said.

Whatever it is that makes a great doubles team, Clouston and Munoz obviously have it and are not afraid to use it.

They will return to action to defend their ranking at the next stage of the collegiate grand slam, the All-American Championships at Austin, Texas, Oct. 15 where the tandem looks to continue its ongoing success.

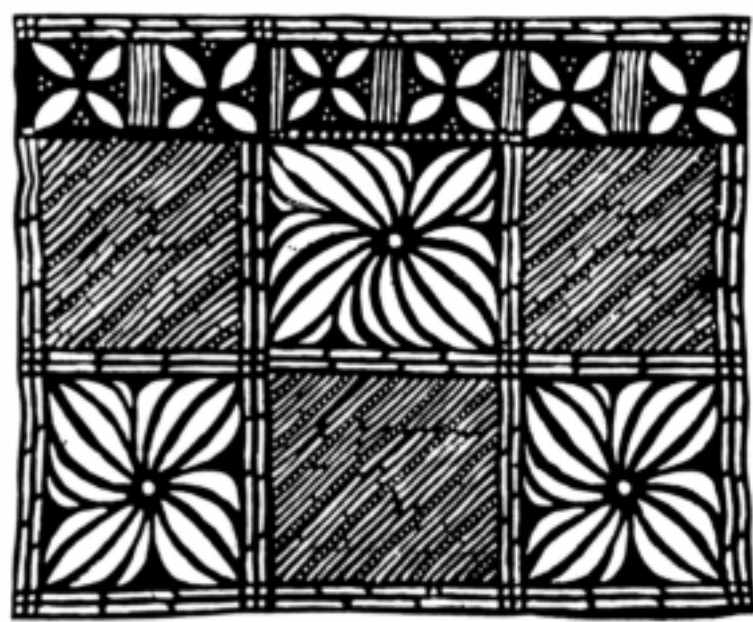
