## Pro-Humanitate Scholars grants due

Applications for Pro Humanitate Scholars service-learning grants are due Feb. 9. The Pro-Humanitate fund annually provides support for five students and faculty each year who collaborate on a community-related research project that synthesizes learning and service.

Student awards will be made for up to \$3,000 for international projects and up to \$2,000 for domestic projects.

Faculty advisor awards will be made for up to \$1,500 for international projects and \$1,000 for domestic projects, with a professional development award of \$500.
